



The Community Foundation of Northern Nevada accepts proposals year-round for grants from the Dream Tags Charitable Fund. Proposals will be considered by the Advisory Board on Dream Tags at their next meeting and on an as-needed basis for emergency funding requests. Grant recommendations must be approved by the Board of Trustees of the Community Foundation. **Deadline for non-emergency proposals is noon on July 31, 2021. Emergency funding requests may be submitted at any time using the Emergency Proposal form.**

The Dream Tags Charitable Fund provides funding to engage Nevadans in wildlife conservation by focusing donated funds to restore resilience in at-risk Nevada habitats with strategic collaborative projects for sustained impact that supports the preservation, protection, management, or restoration of wildlife and its habitat. To be considered for funding, project proposals must demonstrate measurable impact in accordance with this purpose.

Applicants must be registered 501(c)(3) nonprofit agencies, nonprofit educational institutions, or governmental entities. Projects must be performed in Nevada. Grants are typically paid on a reimbursable basis for actual expenditures. Funding will not be provided for work performed prior to grant approval.

Please **submit 1 pdf copy¹ via email** of your proposal. Proposals are encouraged for the following:

- A. Projects that improve, protect, or restore habitat
- B. Projects that embrace unique opportunities for advancing the mission of wildlife conservation in Nevada
- C. Projects that address emergency needs
- D. Other projects that meet the evaluation criteria (see page 6)

Applicants must provide a minimum 25 percent match for funds requested. Guidelines for requests of matching funds are provided in the following application form.

NARRATIVE REQUIREMENTS

1. Specific project goals and measurable outcomes. How do these ties to the project description?

The primary objective of the Nelson Creek Habitat Improvement Project is to provide mule deer a critical forage and thermal cover component as they transition and migrate from summer to winter range. The proposed treatment areas represent two polygons within the greater stop-over, transition, and winter range located in the North Tuscarora mountains. At present, the two polygons identified in this proposal can be characterized by a mix of native herbaceous species and winter annuals (cheatgrass primarily) with little to no brush species. As a result of multiple wildfires, the seed bank has become depleted of brush species which in turn has significantly slowed the recovery of a crucial brush component.

The importance of the North Tuscarora mountains cannot be overstated as it relates to the Management Area 6 mule deer herd health. On heavy snow years this is an important stop-over site as deer migrate to winter range, and on lighter snow years a large proportion of the deer will select to stay here throughout the winter. As this area provides crucial habitat annually regardless of winter conditions for one of Nevada's largest deer herds, its importance for the resource is critical. Measurable outcomes as a result of this project will be most easily measures measured with ecological health metrics, these metrics are most simply defined as the reduction of winter annuals and increased antelope bitterbrush densities.

2. Project location.

The project area lies completely on private land located in the North Tuscarora Mountains, Elko County, NV. The sites can be most easily accessed from the Midas Tuscarora County Road then heading north along Willow creek on a private two track road until you reach the sites. 3. **Project description**. Include site map and aerial photos if applicable/possible. Maps and photos must fit on 8-1/2" x 11" paper and may be attached at the end of your proposal after the budget.

Project implementation at the Nelson Creek sites will be initiated in the late summer of 2021 with an application of pre-emergent herbicide to approximately 700 acres of crucial mule deer habitat. The pre-emergent herbicide controls and prevents the germination of cheatgrass which presents a window to establish desirable plant materials like sagebrush and bitterbrush. The pre-emergent chosen for this project is an imazapic (active pre-emergent agent) based formulation that is bound to sand so that when applied aerially it easily falls through the

vegetation canopy and is not captured by the leaves and stems of existing vegetation like a traditional liquid herbicide application.

Controlling cheatgrass germination to free up resources for existing vegetation and future seedling plantings provides desirable plant materials a competitive advantage that could not otherwise be achieved. The use of the preemergent herbicide imazapic in post fire applications has been implemented with consistent success in controlling cheatgrass gemination, however application of the herbicide over existing vegetation has not been employed historically without having a mechanism to achieve soil contact with the herbicide. The formulation identified for use in this proposal being attached to inert sand granules allows for the necessary canopy penetration and soil contact needed to be effective.

As the native herbaceous component and its seed source remain present in the system, seedling planting to promote brush species recovery in the absence of winter annuals completes a crucial step in recovering a fully functional system for mule deer. The seedling planting phase of this project will be implemented in the fall of 2022 and or spring 2023 in coordination with the Humboldt River Ranch to avoid unintended use by cattle until seedlings reach a mature state.

As this project lies completely on private land, it presents a unique opportunity to improve crucial mule deer habitat without the cumbersome and sometimes slow NEPA process. It should be highlighted that this project is in cooperation with Nevada Gold Mines and the Humboldt River Ranch with a joint objective of achieving well-functioning range condition.

The primary manager of this project will be Matthew Glenn with additional oversight provided by the Eastern Region Habitat Supervisor Caleb McAdoo as the project monitor.

Implementation of this project will begin in the late summer or early fall of 2021 with and application preemergent herbicide to reduce winter annual competition followed by a seedling planting in the fall of 2022 and or spring of 2023.

Delay in the seedling planting component is due to the logistical restraints of purchasing seed, delivering the seed to the prospective nursery, and the time that it will take to grow the plants out to a mature enough state to allow for success.

10. Success. Tell the committee how we will know you succeeded in what you proposed to do.

Reestablishing a crucial brush component in such an important migratory/stop over site for the Area Six mule deer herd provides the species with much needed forage and thermal cover that is not presently available. As mule deer migrate and deplete fat stores made over the summer, and prepare for the difficult winter months, functioning habitat in locations such as this provides these animals the ability to maintain body condition which translates into greater population stability.

Dream Tags Charitable Fund Open Request for Proposal	

GRANTEE REQUIREMENTS

To be eligible for funding, grantees must adhere to the following requirements:

- Monies are to be used and/or disbursed exclusively for the charitable uses and purposes.
- The Dream Tags Fund shall be used exclusively to provide support for the preservation, protection, management or restoration of Nevada's wildlife and its habitat.
- The Charitable Beneficiaries may include 501(c)(3) organizations and governmental entities. Any grants to governmental entities must be made exclusively for public benefit purposes.
- All grantees will be required to sign a grant agreement stipulating their agreement with all of the terms, conditions, and reporting requirements.
- To maintain eligibility to receive grant funds, each Charitable Beneficiary must comply at all times with the following requirements:
 - 1. Charitable Beneficiaries must be exempt from federal income taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Code:
 - 2. Charitable Beneficiaries shall use all Fund distributions toward projects that are appropriate and legal public expenditures;
 - 3. Charitable Beneficiaries must provide financial details and/or reports of their organizations upon request;
 - 4. Charitable Beneficiaries must not use any Fund distributions for political contributions or political advocacy;
 - Charitable Beneficiaries must implement the projects, activities, and/or programs for which
 they received Fund distributions as agreed upon in the grant acceptance agreement, or must
 return all such distributions to the Community Foundation forthwith;
 - 6. Charitable Beneficiaries must provide the Community Foundation with quarterly reports detailing the activities of their projects and/or programs; and
 - 7. Charitable Beneficiaries must sign an agreement regarding their compliance with the qualifications hereof.

PROJECT EVALUATION CRITERIA

Each proposal will be evaluated on criteria that include but are not limited to:

- Measurable outcomes in accordance with the exclusive goal of the Dream Tags Charitable Fund.
- Monitoring and reporting to learn from the project and track project accomplishments.
- Closeness of project focus to areas of funding emphasis (on-the-ground habitat improvements).
- Readiness of sponsoring organization to undertake and complete project.
- Opportunities to partner with others to leverage funds and accomplish larger outcomes.
- Consistency with established Dream Tags Charitable Fund operations (timeline, match, etc.).
- Impact on preservation, protection, management, or restoration of Nevada's wildlife and its habitat.
- Absence of negative or unintended consequences.
- Solutions to known problems as identified through past research and monitoring.
