



The Community Foundation of Northern Nevada is accepting proposals for emergency funding requests from the Dream Tags Charitable Fund. Proposals will be considered by the Advisory Board on Dream Tags on an as-needed basis and grant recommendations must be approved by the Board of Trustees of the Community Foundation.

The Dream Tags Charitable Fund provides funding to engage Nevadans in wildlife conservation by focusing donated funds to restore resilience in at-risk Nevada habitats with strategic collaborative projects for sustained impact that supports the preservation, protection, management, or restoration of wildlife and its habitat. To be considered for funding, project proposals must demonstrate measurable impact in accordance with this purpose.

Applicants must be registered 501(c)(3) nonprofit agencies, nonprofit educational institutions, or governmental entities. Projects must be performed in Nevada. Grants are typically paid on a reimbursable basis for actual expenditures. Funding will not be provided for work performed prior to grant approval.

Please **submit 1 pdf copy<sup>1</sup> via email** of your proposal. Proposals are encouraged for the following:

- A. Projects that improve, protect, or restore habitat
- B. Projects that embrace unique opportunities for advancing the mission of wildlife conservation in Nevada
- C. Projects that address emergency needs
- D. Other projects that meet the evaluation criteria (see page 6)

Applicants must provide a minimum 25 percent match for funds requested. Guidelines for requests of matching funds are provided in the following application form.

1. Specific project goals and measurable outcomes. How do these tie to the project description?

This project aims to plant 74,000 antelope bitterbrush seedlings across 1,000 acres of critical habitat for various wildlife species that burned in the 2022 Wildcat Fire on Forest Service land. Most of the antelope bitterbrush that was burned in the fire is not expected to resprout in the burned area on a large scale due to the decadence of the plant community at the time of burning and the multiple years of drought stress prior to the fire. This planting effort will help give the bitterbrush community a jumpstart in reestablishing in an area that thousands of mule deer rely upon each year during their migration. Along with the seeding efforts completed in the project area on Forest Service land in February 2023 by the Nevada Department of Wildlife (NDOW), this planting will help achieve restoration goals of reestablishing the mountain brush community relied upon by elk, pronghorn antelope, mule deer, Greater sage-grouse, and dark kangaroo mice local to the area. This project will also contribute to the priority management action listed in the Nevada Wildlife Action Plan to restore 2+ million acres of degraded sagebrush habitat across the state by restoring a vital component of the mountain brush community that was burned.

The establishment of antelope bitterbrush in the recovering mountain brush community two years post-planting will be the measurable outcome of this project. The first year after planting typically has the sharpest decline in plant survival, but the survival in the second year after planting is typically a good representation of overall planting success.

### 2. Project location.

This planting will occur approximately 43 miles northwest of Wells, NV across 1,000 acres of the 3,075 acres of Forest Service land that burned in the 2022 Wildcat Fire on the Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest (HTNF) Jarbidge Ranger District in Elko County, Nevada in NDOW Management Unit 072. The attached map shows the proposed project location.

The 2022 Wildcat Fire burned 21,423 acres total with 17,353 acres occurring on Bureau of Land Management (BLM) land, 3,075 acres occurring on Forest Service land, and 955 acres on private land. Elko BLM seeded a majority of the burned area with upland grasses, forbs, and shrubs in fall 2022 through March 2023 and is also planning to plant up to 1 million sagebrush and/or bitterbrush seedlings throughout burned BLM land in fall 2023 and/or spring 2024. Forest Service was unable to secure funding to be able to reseed or plant seedlings on their portion of the burn, so NDOW seeded sagebrush and a watershed mix on 1,550 acres of Forest Service land in February 2023, and the Area 7 Mule Deer Enhancement Program (MDEP) subcommittee proposed bitterbrush seedling planting in fall 2023 to accommodate the sagebrush seeding in restoring the mountain brush community so relied upon by the diverse wildlife community in the area. The MDEP Oversight Committee ranked this project as the number one priority for the entire State of Nevada. The USFS HTNF Jarbidge Ranger District is supportive of this effort and has committed to completing the required State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) clearance before planting is scheduled to occur in fall 2023. This project will also be a Shared Stewardship project.

The proposed project area has experienced severe drought in the years previous to the Wildcat Fire and, in combination with the decadent age of the mountain brush community, was in an extremely stressed state at the time of the wildfire. These conditions have been shown to reduce bitterbrush resprouting post-fire and, given the importance of bitterbrush to mule deer during their migration through this burned area, planting of bitterbrush seedlings was determined to be a priority to help re-establish the habitat values in the burned area. Additionally, decadent plants that are mowed back or burned to stimulate new growth have been shown to only produce nutritious forage for the next 3- to 5-years. Planting seedlings will allow for the establishment of new healthy plants to provide nutritious feed for decades.

Of the 3,075 acres of Forest Service land that burned in the Wildcat Fire, 1,000 acres have been targeted for planting 74,000 antelope bitterbrush seedlings in strategic locations with biodegradable caging to protect the seedlings from overutilization in the first couple years of establishment. Caging will allow for some utilization of the far-reaching branches through the caging but will prevent utilization to detrimental levels. Lucky Peak Nursery is currently growing 40,000 bareroot bitterbrush seedlings and 34,000 containerized bitterbrush seedlings for this project. Planting of the 74,000 seedlings will be partially done by volunteers and partially through a planting contract, ideally in fall 2023, but potentially in spring 2024 if weather and access conditions do not align with timing of seedling production.

The Jarbidge Ranger District of the Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest is in full support of the project and ensures that surveys and archeological clearance through the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) should be acquired before planned planting time in fall of 2023. No additional permitting is required.

5. If **future phases** of the project will be needed, identify anticipated sources of funding.

There are no future phases planned for this project, but depending on the success of this planting there is potential for a second phase of planting in future years.

Two full-time staff positions are involved in the project: the Eastern Region Habitat Biologist and the Area 7 Game Biologist. The Eastern Region Volunteer Coordinator will be involved full-time for the volunteer portion of the project.

8. Number of volunteers involved in project and an estimated number of volunteer hours.

Approximately 50 volunteers are anticipated to participate in this project. Estimating 7 hours of work each and at least 48 miles of travel to the project site, volunteer match is estimated at \$15,726.00.

Seedlings will be grown out by Lucky Peak Nursery spring through September of 2023 and ready for planting in October of 2023. The volunteer event will be planned for a weekend in October 2023. The planting contract will be solicited in summer of 2023 with a performance period of October 2023 through spring 2024. The

seedlings will ideally be planted in fall 2023, but weather and/or access conditions could cause the planting to be pushed to spring 2024 if the timing of ideal conditions does not align with plant availability from the nursery and contractor availability to plant.

#### **GRANTEE REQUIREMENTS**

To be eligible for funding, grantees must adhere to the following requirements:

- Monies are to be used and/or disbursed exclusively for the charitable uses and purposes.
- The Dream Tags Fund shall be used exclusively to provide support for the preservation, protection, management or restoration of Nevada's wildlife and its habitat.
- The Charitable Beneficiaries may include 501(c)(3) organizations and governmental entities. Any grants to governmental entities must be made exclusively for public benefit purposes.
- All grantees will be required to sign a grant agreement stipulating their agreement with all of the terms, conditions, and reporting requirements.
- To maintain eligibility to receive grant funds, each Charitable Beneficiary must comply at all times with the following requirements:
  - 1. Charitable Beneficiaries must be exempt from federal income taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Code;
  - Charitable Beneficiaries shall use all Fund distributions toward projects that are appropriate and legal public expenditures;
  - 3. Charitable Beneficiaries must provide financial details and/or reports of their organizations upon request;
  - Charitable Beneficiaries must not use any Fund distributions for political contributions or political advocacy;
  - Charitable Beneficiaries must implement the projects, activities, and/or programs for which
    they received Fund distributions as agreed upon in the grant acceptance agreement, or must
    return all such distributions to the Community Foundation forthwith;
  - 6. Charitable Beneficiaries must provide the Community Foundation with quarterly reports detailing the activities of their projects and/or programs; and
  - 7. Charitable Beneficiaries must sign an agreement regarding their compliance with the qualifications hereof.

#### **PROJECT EVALUATION CRITERIA**

Each proposal will be evaluated on criteria that include but are not limited to:

- Measurable outcomes in accordance with the exclusive goal of the Dream Tags Charitable Fund.
- Monitoring and reporting to learn from the project and track project accomplishments.
- Closeness of project focus to areas of funding emphasis (on-the-ground habitat improvements).
- · Readiness of sponsoring organization to undertake and complete project.
- Opportunities to partner with others to leverage funds and accomplish larger outcomes.
- Consistency with established Dream Tags Charitable Fund operations (timeline, match, etc.).
- Impact on preservation, protection, management, or restoration of Nevada's wildlife and its habitat.
- Absence of negative or unintended consequences.
- Solutions to known problems as identified through past research and monitoring.
